Operations Good Cheer

N737LM, my daughter Sydney and I participated in Operation Good Cheer on Saturday December 7, 2013. This is my 4th successful trip on the first Saturday in December each year. Twice we have been shut out due to weather. (85M and 08K flown by Joe Hass and Dick Moy also participated this year.)

Operation Good Cheer has been delivering donated Christmas presents to foster children throughout Michigan since 1971. This year 5000 foster children will receive more than 15000 gifts. The goal is that the kids have a Christmas despite their circumstances. Yes, the gifts could be delivered in trucks or SUV's or even UPS but that is not why we fly.

On Tuesday December 3rd my cell phone rings and it is Jerry Drew, the now retired PTK air traffic controller. After a quick hello he asks that I land at KPTK at 1050 local time. This will be my first goal for Saturday morning which arrives with some frigid sunshine and a few snowflakes. However, the weather looks okay in most of the Enchanted Mitten and the forecast looks for improvement throughout the state.

After touching down at KPTK at exactly 1050 things get busy in a hurry. We are marshaled to the ramp and shut down. There are planes everywhere including a group of helicopters that will be flying together. Entering Barnstormer's we are instructed to check in with the Operation Good Cheer desk. They ask us to take a load to Big Rapids (KRQB). Alongside the check in desk is a weather station. I know that lake effect snow has been hanging around that area and I quickly see that weather at KRQB is getting worse not better. Back to the OGC desk I go and sure enough 3 other pilots have also opted to ask for another destination. Port Huron was now loading and they ask us to go to KPHN. The people working the OGC desk asked us to return to KPTK after our trip because they need 50 more planes that they need for later in the day. We then stop at the ATC desk. They quickly put us into the NA system. The weather is clear towards the east and we opt for VFR flight following. This ends up saving lots of ground time. ATC hands us a sheet with specific procedures and frequencies to monitor. A quick taxi to truck #1 and we literally stuff 7LM to visible capacity. The wrapped presents are extremely light so weight and balance was not an issue. Sydney has become an expert at squeezing every last gift into the plane. During our very long taxi we got to see the helicopters all take off at once as well as the landing of the Canadair Global Express that took a load to the UP.

Our arrival at KPHN was met by some very thankful volunteers who helped, but wouldn't touch the plane without my permission. Smiles were everywhere. After another quick flight back to KPTK and the Barnstormer's ramp we could quickly tell that there were far fewer planes than when we had left. We were met at the door by OGC volunteers who asked if we could take a

load to Gladwin (KGDW). A quick look at weather, another loading by Sydney and we were off. The volunteers at Gladwin welcomed us with hot chocolate and pizza after we unloaded the plane. These people really work hard for the children. During our return flight at 5500 we enjoyed a smooth ride and a tail wind pushing our ground speed to 171 knots.

We hope that that our efforts and the efforts of the countless volunteers make Christmas a little merrier for these children. I know that it has for this pilot and his daughter.

Southeastern Michigan Modelers Again Help Foster Care Residents

For the 42nd year Operations Good Cheer provided Christmas gifts for infants, children, teen and adults with disabilities who live in foster care in Michigan. After being "weathered out" with heavy snow and rain in 2012 aeromodelers were once again airborne in 2013 to fulfill the theme "Making Christmas Wishes Come True".

Pilot Joe Hass and Co-Pilot Gary Weaks of the Pontiac Miniature Aircraft Club and also a private pilot removed the back seat from N9885M and then crammed 3 bikes, a tricycle and over 40 wrapped gifts for the trip from Oakland International Airport to Kalamazoo, MI. On landing in KZOO Gary and Joe were greeted by the bevy of enthusiastic Santa's Helpers to unload the airplane and transport the gifts to waiting vehicles. In total 4,986 foster residents received almost 15,000 gifts.

Business jets took loads the greatest distances. Private aircraft travelled back and forth across the lower peninsula of Michigan helping Santa spread "Good Cheer". The cold temperatures and lake effect snow didn't slow down the energetic group. Other TOPS members including Dick Moy and Bob Eger flew missions too.

Co Pilot Gary Weaks' wife Phyllis again worked on the ground crew at Pontiac. Gary said "We were able to fit so many gifts into the Skylane that Santa himself would be proud!"

Coldwater – Branch County Memorial (OEB)



From the Flight Surgeon

The FAA recently proposed routine screening for Obstructive Sleep Apnea (OSA) in pilots. This is a condition where the person stops breathing multiple times during the night. The risk factors for the condition include short neck and obesity amongst others. OSA can contribute to medical conditions which may include heart attacks and possible sudden death at night.

The FAA's concern with this condition seems to be borne out of a NTSB study which links falling asleep while operating a motor vehicle. The incidents have been mostly motor carrier but have involved aircraft and Air Traffic Control as well.

While the concern over the disorder is valid and a laudable public safety/public health goal I have some concerns for the implications for the recreational pilot who is not flying for a living. If OSA is suspected the tests to confirm or rule out the disorder can be costly.

Our latest information seems to indicate that this initiative will likely be put on hold pending a NPRM or other further consideration. I think this is a good idea. The concept of screening for the disorder makes sense but the implementation I believe needs some further thought.
